

5 tips for helping your child

- Use the <u>Microsoft Translator</u> app for live captioning and translation. Translator can be used for live, one to one communication in 53 languages, enabling multilingual conversations between your child and their teacher or between you and your child's teacher. Leverage the built in Translate capability to help ensure your child understands the content their teacher is providing. Your child can translate text in Word for the web. Go to Office.com and open Word. Under the "Review" tab, click "Translate" and select the language. Translate is also available in Outlook for web so your child can translate emails.
